UNFINISHED BUSINESS

- (1) Project Updates
 - a) Copley Ridge Recreation Trail Update
 - Interpretive Signage Staff confirmed that trail map signage has been completed and installed at trail heads, final prints of the interpretive signage for the Pileated Woodpecker and Salal expected this month (after comments/logo from Snaw-Naw-As re Traditional First Nations Uses of Salal), and drafts for Black Bear, Cougar and Oregon Grape underway. Staff noted focus will return to the public information community-wide parks/trails brochure/map (for printing and website) after the interpretive sign designs are completed, with intent of completion in 2017. The Commission suggested inviting and acknowledging the Aspengrove School students involved with preparing the interpretive signage, when the Pileated Woodpecker signs are being placed on the trail.
 - Construction Two bridges off Lorenzen planned for construction Fall 2017; may need to carry forward funding for one for completion in 2018. There was some uncertainty regarding the location of the proposed bridges; staff to clarify at next meeting.

b) Rotary Park Mountain Bike Skills Circuit - Update

After missing the construction schedule in the Spring due to weather, drainage work was completed and the Mountain Bike Skills Circuit project was postponed until an opening in the designer/construction crew's schedule. Work is planned as a Fall project. Hoots designer met with the Director of Public Works on site on September 13, 2017.

(2) Minetown Day September 9, 2017 – Update

Staff reported that the event was completed under budget; a planning group meeting is scheduled for October 11, 2017; and a summary report will be brought forward to the Commission after all invoices have been received. Minetown Day planning group chair, J. Ohly provided an update, noting that overall there was a good turnout and good spirit despite the weather and competing events. There was suggestion to look at coordinating "Lantzville Got Talent" earlier. The Commission acknowledged and expressed appreciation for all the sponsors, including: Koers & Associates, Copcan Civil Ltd. and Woodlot 1475, M&J Tree Service, Keller's Jewellers Ltd., Teresa Battle, Woodgrove Centre, Ivanhoe Cambridge, Susanne Turnbull & Guides, Progressive Waste Solutions, 4Cats Art Studio, Tiger Mountain Music Studio, Riso Foods, Blissful Day Spa, Quality Foods, Tom Whipps, Jack DeJong, and all the many volunteers, vendors and exhibitors.

Characteristics: Low-growing creeping evergreen shrub up to .6 metres tall. Leaves are in long clusters of 9–19 dark green, holly-like leaflets; leaf margins are slightly prickly.

Flowers/Eruit Small bright yellow flowers in elongated clusters at tops of stems bloom in early spring. Become dense clusters of blue berries with a dusty coating in spring and summer.

FUN FACT!

Charracteristics Sprawling to erect evergreen shrub grows to a height of 1-3 metres. Leaves are thick, leathery and shiny, pointed, egg-shaped, and 5-10 cm long. Stems often reddish in colour.

Flowers/Fruit Small with bell-like blooms emerge from red-tinged buds beginning in spring and bloom through summer; grow along the end of stems in showy clusters of 5-15 flowers. In later summer, fleshy flower sepals from small blue to dark purple berries covered with tiny hairs that hang in rows.

Animal Uses Deer and elk eat the twigs, and birds and other animals including bears eat the branches and berries. Salal cover provides shelter for small animals and is a place of rest and bedding for elk and deer.

Traditional First Nations Uses Salal berries were a major source of food, and the plant was used for medicinal and cultural purposes by the Coastal Salish First Nations. The branches and leaves were used to line cooking pits.

Home Garden Applications

Grows where almost nothing else will, in deep understorey forest groves, moist or dry soils, in full sun or deep shade. Does not transplant well, but is generally available at garden centers.

Pileated Woodpecker

Dryocopus Pileatus



Description Pileated Woodpeckers are very large – they are almost the size of a crow! They have a triangular head with a very distinct flaming-red crest and the rest of their bodies are usually black with white strips. Male Pileated Woodpeckers can be identified by a red stripe down their cheek.

Habitat Pileated Woodpeckers are mostly found in deciduous, coniferous or mixed forests. They can even be found in some suburban areas with large trees all across Canada and the United States.

Food Pileated Woodpeckers love to eat carpenter ants – some birds will have a diet of 97% carpenter ants! They eat other insects such as cockroaches and flies, and as well – blackberries and poison ivy.

Nestring Dead trees are a preferred nesting place. Typically, the male will do most of the excavating, leaving a unique rectangular hole. The female will lay a clutch of 3 to 5 eggs and, after the brood is raised, the woodpeckers will abandon the nest and will very rarely use it again. The abandoned nest holes offer crucial shelter to many other species.



Watch for Woodpeckers along the Trail, and the trees that they have pecked in search of delicious bugs! They really loved this tree that they dug out and made homes in it.











The Pileated Woodpecker's tongues are wrapped around their skull to absorb the shock from pecking the wood! Woodpeckers use their tongues as spears to eat insects and as rakes to clean out wood chips!

Staff had the playground equipment in all of the Parks inspected by the MIA Risk Management Services and have found that the playground equipment in Copley Park is in need of replacing. The inspection found that the play structures either had to be updated to meet the most recent Playspace Specifications or replaced. Staff have looked at updating the structures only to find that parts for the aged structures are no longer available. The Parks and Recreation Commission was notified of the findings by the MIA Inspector and decided to replace the existing structure to accommodate a 5 to 12 years old child. Staff are therefore requesting funds for the replacement of the Copley Park playground equipment in 2019.

Staff had the playground equipment in all of the Parks inspected by the MIA Risk Management Services and have found that the playground equipment in Huddlestone Park is in need of replacing. The inspection found that the play structures, including the helicopter, be updated to meet the most recent Playspace Specifications or replaced. Staff have looked at updating the structures only to find that, if updated, would likely only last 5 to 7 years. The Parks and Recreation Commission was notified of the findings by the MIA Inspector and decided to replace the existing structure to accommodate a 5 to 12 years old child and place a small structure to accommodate a 2 to 5 year old child. Because of this, staff are recommending the installation of a playground structure that will accommodate 2 to 5 year old child as well as the replacement of the existing structure to accommodate a 5 to 12 year old child.

- 9. If the parking lot is not adequate for your function, cars may be parked along Lantzville Road. Please refrain from using Huddlestone Road as it does not allow emergency vehicles to get through in an emergency situation.
